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## MINUTES OF THE 2001 BUSINESS MEETING OF THE SOCIETY

The annual Business Meeting was held at 7:00 P.M. in the Gwinnett Room of the Atlanta Hilton and Towers Hotel on 28 December 2001, presided over by the President, Professor Therese-Anne Druart.

The President opened the meeting by asking for a motion to approve the minutes which appeared in the April newsletter. A motion to that end was made and seconded and passed unanimously.

Prof. Long, Secretary-Treasurer, was then asked to report on the meeting of the Executive Committee which had taken place earlier several hours earlier in the Adams Room. The Secretary reported that our membership as of December 1 stood at 311, which represented a gain of ten from last year--the first time since

1994 that the downward trend was reversed. He also announced that the email addresses of members were now on the Society's web page, thanks in large measure to the initiative of Profs. South and Taylor.

The same Prof. Long then circulated the Treasurer's report. Receipts for the year totaled \$44,588.56, expenditures \$19,324.39, leaving the Society with assets of \$25,264.39. Two CD's matured and were converted into TIAA-CREF funds. It was the consensus of the committee that our monies in the money market fund be minimized and more profitable instruments selected.

Prof. Dobbs-Weinstein next reported on behalf of the Program Committee. There had been a good session and well attended at the PMR Conference in September, though she admitted missing the deadline for the Kalamazoo conference. There followed an extended discussion revolving around two topics: the advisability of advertising for papers; and the tradition of proportionality among the different areas of medieval philosophy (Arab, Jewish, Latin Christian, and Renaissance). With respect to the former it was agreed that papers for the APA should be invited (as in the past); papers for the Kalamazoo conference, on the other hand, can be solicited, and it was suggested that topics might be announced. With respect to the APA it was generally agreed that some balance should be maintained, with usually no more than one paper from the Islamic-Jewish tradition and no more than one from the Renaissance. It was also agreed, however, that this balance should not be applied mathematically, and might be violated for the sake of theme, or simply because the principal value should be to find the best speakers available. Prof. Dobbs-Weinstein recounted her

difficulties this autumn, owing in large, but not exclusive, measure to the events of 9/11. She requested and received Prof. Noone's agreement to make arrangements for a session for the ACPA.

Prof. Wilson next reported for the Publications Committee, which he chairs. There was but one submission for the monograph series this year, and it was judged not to have met the criteria. The same Prof. Wilson then circulated and annotated his report on the Newsletter. There were, as always during his tenure, a newsletter in the spring and another in the fall, the cost varying this year from \$372 to \$413. Having edited a total of 11 letters since the fall of 1996, Prof. Wilson asked that he be replaced, citing pressures from his other responsibilities. A vote of thanks was unanimously passed, and there was a brief discussion of possible successors, but with no final decision having been reached.

Prof. McGrade as chair of the Nominating Committee presented the results of his group's careful deliberations, the results of which would shortly be announced by the President.

Next the new version of the Constitution was distributed by the Secretary, with the changes agreed upon at last year's meeting. After a brief discussion and several minor changes, there was a motion made and passed unanimously to approve the changes and to pass it on to the general membership at the business meeting for final approval. Profs. Clark, Druart, and Long, as members of the Constitution Committee, were thanked for their efforts.

The Treasurer presented the 2002 budget, and following several adjustments, a final figure of \$4,320 was approved.

Prof. Long then read a letter from Johns Hopkins University Press

requesting our membership list, either as an exchange for their list or outright purchase. The upshot of the discussion that followed was that the Secretary should instead try to negotiate a half-page ad in the JHP in exchange for our list.

There was a considerable discussion of the \$500 prize once voted on by the Society for papers by younger scholars. The consensus was to reactivate the offer, to propose clarifications, and to promulgate the news more widely. To this end an ad hoc Prize Committee was established, with Profs. Marrone (as chair), Dobbs-Weinstein, Long, and Wilson. A deadline of March 1 was set, with the prize to be announced on our web site, in the new brochure, and in the to-be-negotiated ad in the JHP.

Prof. Zupko suggested that the members be surveyed for their views on the conduct and direction of SMRP, and another ad hoc committee, the Survey Committee, was constituted, with the aforementioned Prof. Zupko as chair and Profs. Dobbs-Weinstein and Ingham as his assistants.

With no new business to conduct, President Druart called for a motion to adjourn at 12:55, with 5 minutes left on our tenure on the room. This concluded the report on the Executive Committee meeting.

The chair of the Nominating Committee, Prof. McGrade, announced the results of the vote taken at the Executive Committee meeting: Dr. McGonagle had been nominated for a second three-year term and Prof. Hibbs of Boston College for an initial term. The President then asked if there were any other nominees from the floor; seeing none, she entertained a motion to approve the nominees, and the motion passed without opposition.

The President then asked for a motion to approve the revisions discussed and voted on earlier in the day to the Society's Constitution, copies of which had been distributed to those present. The revisions for the most part involved clarifications, inclusive language, and/or the deletion of provisions relevant only to the original constituting of the Society. The motion was made, seconded, and passed without discussion.

Prof. Druart then called the meeting to a close, and introduced the chair of the session of papers to follow.
