The annual business meeting was held at 7:30 p.m. in the Harvard Room of the Copley Marriott Hotel, Boston, on December 28, 2004.

President Steven Marrone called the Business meeting to order at 7:35 pm. Mary Beth Ingham presented the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting. She also reported that the assets

of the Society are currently \$27,614.35. There are currently 320 members. She announced that there would be an effort made over the next several months to update current addresses, especially email addresses.

An announcement was made about the affiliation of SIEPM with APA. In the future, SIEPM will sponsor a session at Eastern APA. This represents a more collaborative working relationship between SMRP and SIEPM. In April 2005, we will co-sponsor a session at the Central Division meeting of the APA.

Reti Medievali was established in 1998 by a group of scholars from the Universities of Florence, Naples, Palermo, Venice, and Verona, and started online in May of 2000. In 2001 more scholars from other Italian universities joined the editorial board. Since 2004, the contributions of a group of Italian and foreign corresponding editors have extended the thematic and geographic range of our initiative.

RM aims at establishing itself as an on-line community of medievalists, beyond specialist fields, and at encouraging institutions and individual scholars in experimenting and exploring, through a common action, the potential of new communication technologies.

RM proposes itself as a high-level scientific and informative website and aims at offering texts, working tools and reflections on historiography, in keeping with present trends in Italian research and teaching practice.

Texts and materials published by **RM** are peer-reviewed by the editorial board.

RM has been published since 2002 by Firenze University Press and deposited

in digital form at the Biblioteca
Nazionale Centrale of Florence.
